

Teens enjoyed Adulting 101 sessions that taught life skills like cooking and car maintenance. Interactive, themed events were also popular, such as steampunk art night and after-hours glow egg hunt.

IN 2022-2023, WE RE-EVALUATED AND EXPERIMENTED with the programs we offered and surveyed our users to find out what they most want and need. People of all ages are looking for hands-on and experiential programs, especially when they can connect with others over shared interests.



Adults appreciated art and music opportunities, including painting workshops led by professional artists and our outdoor concert series featuring local bands. We also hosted author talks, including one with award-winning novelist Silas House. (Our Bridgerton-themed tea party was also a big hit!)

Our driving motivation in collection development is to grow and maintain a variety of books and media that provide entertainment, enhance learning, and reflect the diversity of our community. Your requests for books and media play an important role in our collection decision-making.

VOX Books

Thanks to a generous donation from Friends of the Johnson City Public Library, we added 60 VOX Books to our Children's Library. VOX Books have an audio version built into the print book itself. This technology gives kids an all-in-one read-along option, eliminating the need for computers, tablets, or CDs.

NEW Collections

Buffalo Mountain

We created the Buffalo Mountain collection, a dedicated section for books by local authors, poets, and historians. The collection also includes books about local interest topics. From longtime Johnson City residents to people who are new to the area. this collection is a terrific entry point for learning about our city and Appalachian region.

Nintendo Switch

In response to user feedback, we added Nintendo Switch games to our collection for the first time. These games are incredibly popular with all ages and circulate constantly. We plan to add more Switch games to our collection in the coming year because of their high demand.

UPDATING Spaces

This year we refurbished areas in our building based on user trends. We replaced the heavy, large tables in the Buffalo Mountain Room with smaller, functional furniture more conducive to individual work. These pieces include charging ports, are better suited to our users' needs, and maximize the space itself.

We revamped our Galleria as well, and now host monthly exhibits featuring local artists. These displays showcase the incredible artistic talent in our community (like painter Katie Murphy).

Imagination Library



Washington County Imagination Library gifts up to 60 high-quality, age-appropriate books to build a child's home library before kindergarten. Every month, the program sends a free book to enrolled Washington County kids from birth to age 5. Every Tennessee child is eligible for Imagination Library through their county affiliate.
