# STAFF SPOTLIGHT Tyler Wilmoth Assistant Director of Collections & Metadata

Tyler Wilmoth is your Library's Assistant Director of Collections and Metadata. He oversees the process of how we select, acquire, organize, and label all of the Library's materials. Every item you borrow starts its journey in Wilmoth's department. We spoke with him about his job and how his team curates the Library's collection.

#### What draws you to collection development?

I'm motivated by the ability to make a positive impact on our community. When we select materials, we ensure that the Library meets the needs and interests of our users, and we get to help foster a love for reading and learning. I love discovering titles that can inspire, educate, and entertain others.

#### How do you decide what materials to add to our collection to keep it up to date?

Our Collection Management committee, which includes staff from the Children, Teen, and Adult departments, chooses materials. Together, we ensure that the Library's collection stays fresh and relevant for our community.

The committee regularly analyzes circulation statistics and uses the Library's collection development policy to make informed decisions. We rely on professional reviews, bestseller lists, book award announcements, and our staff's expertise. We consider a book's literary, artistic, historic, or scientific merit, as well as its accuracy and authoritativeness.

Our users' recommendations are also critically important to us. These suggestions are valuable, because they help us understand our community's needs and interests.

# Who We Are Attentive

determine the decisions we make and the culture we create as an organization.

#### One of the values that guides our organization is attentiveness. This means that we are dedicated to noticing and listening to people's needs. We care about our users' concerns and respond in a thoughtful way.

In the last year, we embodied this value by holding a series of focus groups with parents about our Children's Library programming. We wanted to see if we were effectively meeting parents' and children's needs, and how we could improve moving forward. We asked questions that helped us understand their experiences of Children's Library events, and how specific factors helped or hindered their ability to, or interest in, attending.

We used what we learned in these group conversations to evaluate and adapt what we were already doing, and to design new programs. For instance, we redesigned our preschool storytimes to focus on developmental levels instead of strict age brackets, which was a topic that came up often in the focus groups.





## THE LEGEND OF A WISE GRANNY

As the Halloween season approaches, I've been revisiting the Tennessee Room's collection of strange and supernatural tales that abound in our region. I've found myself re-entranced by the age-old mythos of the witch and its manifestation in East Tennessee folklore and history.

Old stories of the "magic women" of the mountains in Northeast Tennessee were widely shared and believed. Author Christopher Coleman recounts one such tale in his book "Ghosts and Haunts of Tennessee," which you can find in the Library's Tennessee Room. Coleman tells the story of "Granny Wise," a legend that was still being widely circulated in the 1930s.

Coleman contends that Granny Wise's actual name was Weiss, but that her name changed as her notoriety grew. Along with her dependability in the healing arts-particularly in healing newborns' thrush-Granny Weiss was infamous for her ability to predict calamitous events.

For instance, in the years prior to the Civil War, Granny Weiss had a vision of a northern star colliding with a star far to the south. People came to believe that this vision portended the coming of the war. Granny Weiss remains the epitome of legendary Appalachian wise women because of stories like this.

While the soothsaying abilities of Granny Weiss and women like her certainly make for fascinating stories, often these archetypal characters filled mundane roles and performed non-glamourous tasks in their superstitious communities. Folktales abound about the mundanity of wise women's work in East Tennessee, from curing "the gravel" (kidney stones) to finding matches for unmarried young women.

If this historical tidbit piqued your interest, spend some time in the Library's Tennessee Room. This Halloween season, join me in poring over the strange and wonderful tales to be found in our local history collection.


