STAFF SPOTLIGHT

Celeste Smedley | Business Manager

Meet Celeste Smedley, your Library's Business Manager and one of the longest serving employees at the Library. Her job may be behind the scenes, but once you start looking you'll see Celeste's impact everywhere. From keeping the lights on to ensuring materials are paid for, her dedication powers so much of what we do. Recently, we asked Celeste to share a bit about her own library story.

i'm a lifelong Jonesborough, Tennessee native who once dreamed of being Barbie: wardrobe, Dreamhouse, the whole deal. Instead, I found my groove in bookkeeping. I hold an associate degree in Business Administration and am a licensed Certified Public Bookkeeper. I'm also the first in my family to graduate from college, proving that ambition wears more than just high heels.

I've worked at Johnson City Public Library since 2002, starting as an Acquisitions Clerk in Collection Services. I loved ordering materials, and opening boxes of new books was my favorite part of the job. In 2008, I moved into Administration as the Office Manager, and in late 2023, I stepped into my current role as Business Manager.

My main responsibilities involve managing the Library's financial operations, including monthly bank reconciliations and preparing financial reports for the Library's Board of Directors. I also process staff payroll, handle onboarding for new hires, and manage Human Resources-related forms. Additionally, since Johnson City Public Library is the Washington County Imagination Library affiliate, I

oversee the program's operations and finances.

What I enjoy most about my work is that no two days are the same. I also love that numbers are numbers—they have to balance, no exceptions. There's a real satisfaction in spotting discrepancies

and figuring out how to fix them.

determine the decisions we make and the culture we create as an organization.

One of the values that guides our organization is "hometown." We are the community crossroads. We provide safe, shared spaces where people from all walks of life can come for learning and entertainment, connection with others, and a sense of fellowship. We belong to our community and care about its health and growth, so we offer a place where exploration, mutual respect, and collaboration are nurtured.

In the days and weeks following Hurricane Helene last year, our "hometown" spirit became especially apparent and urgent. Many in our community were without vital resources, including electricity and internet service. The Library's free technology became a way for people to communicate with loved ones, get information and news, charge their devices, and apply for assistance. Remote workers and area students spent their workdays at the Library. For weeks after the storm, we added extra seating throughout the building to accommodate the influx of people. Our free technology was, and continues to be, a vital and unique expression that we are "hometown."





More Than Books and Beer **A Library-Brewery Partnership**

Your Library and Johnson City Brewing Company (JCBC) partnered in 2020 to create "The 1895," a specialty beer honoring the Library's 125th anniversary. This smooth, full-bodied pre-prohibition style lager was a hit, and in the last five years JCBC has done several limited edition re-releases.

Be sure to visit the brewery this September to try The 1895, which JCBC is offering again for a limited time!

Anyone who has visited the brewery knows that flavor experimentation is at the heart of what they do. JCBC founder and owner Eric Latham said, "That's the fun of craft brewing trying different things and seeing how they work together. If you can come up with an idea, you can brew it. Sometimes experiments come out good and sometimes not so good. But we gotta try."

This dedication to experimentation is also clear in JCBC's enthusiasm for pursuing community partnerships. Latham sees creative collaborations like ours as a tangible way to deepen community ties. He said,

Working together we create something new, move forward, and make progress. The partnership between the Library and Johnson City Brewing is more than books and beer. It's bringing people together and making our community stronger.

This fall we're partnering with JCBC again, this time to bring non-alcoholic brewed drinks to our Shirefest celebration. JCBC will be pouring their Sarsparilla root beer and BRAND NEW butter beer at the event! They'll also talk with folks about how to make beer and root beer. Stop by their tent to get a taste of JCBC's inventive spirit and creative approach to brewing.



HEIDI THE D&G'S **Pumpkin Almond Cookies**

From the kitchen of Library Director Julia Turpin

These dog treats make great snacks for pups out trick-or-treating on Halloween, and they can be a fun addition to your holiday baking routine. They come together in minutes, are easy to roll, and can be adapted to suit your pup's taste. Heidi loves this classic cinnamon and almond butter recipe, but you can substitute oat flour or peanut butter.

You can even adapt the recipe to create savory treats. Use low sodium broth in place of water, and try herbs like oregano, parsley, and rosemary. (Be sure to speak with your veterinarian about your dog's specific needs before

raiding the spice cabinet!)

Ingredients

- 2 and 1/2 cups whole wheat flour (or vet-recommended grain)
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup pumpkin
- 2 Tbsp. almond or peanut butter (without xylitol)
- 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup water (or just enough for dough to form)


Baking Instructions

- Preheat oven to 350° F.
- Combine all ingredients in a large mixing bowl. Dough will be crumbly.
- Add water until the dough comes together.
- On lightly floured surface, roll dough to 1/4-inch thickness.
- Cut into desired shapes and place on ungreased cookie sheet.
- Bake for 35 minutes or until golden brown.
- Let cool and serve to your patient pup.
